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## Tools for Talking to Your Members of Congress About Child Care During August Recess

#### Early childhood educators know all about the importance of recess!

But we're not talking about the kind where kids play outside. Instead, we're talking about the kind where Members of Congress come home on break—which can be just as important to ensuring children's healthy growth and development!

That's because this kind of recess offers crucial opportunities to connect with elected officials outside of Washington, D.C. and in your shared communities. This year, we're focused on letting Congress know why funding child care is so important, so we hope you'll take advantage of recess opportunities to share with them all the ways children, parents, educators and businesses benefit when families have access to high-quality child care!

## **Reach Out**

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<u>Find the home district address and phone number for your member of Congress</u>. Call or set up a time to <u>visit</u> to make sure they know their constituents want them to build on the bipartisan commitment to early childhood education by growing investments in child care, Head Start and early learning.

## **Extend Invitations**

Invite members of Congress and/or their staff to visit a high-quality early childhood education program so they can understand first-hand the benefits these programs provide to children, families and communities.

In fact, <u>recent research</u> provides concrete evidence that high-quality early learning opportunities can extend to subsequent generations to help break the cycle of poverty. Thanks to investments in critical programs like CCDBG, Congress is giving us the tools to achieve these important outcomes. Moving forward, we hope members of Congress will expand these investments in early childhood education.
